


Middle School Students of the Quarter



SNI Native Connections introduces: Family Engagement Program!

A new Family Engagement Program, sponsored by the Native Connections Committee, is holding a grand kick off April 3rd at the Cattaraugus Wellness Center and April 4th at the Allegany ACC. Both events will feature a family movie night, snacks and a free craft for the first 20 participating families. Also families will be eligible for prizes at both kickoff events including a Buffalo Zoo Family Membership.

The Family Engagement initiative, generated through the Native Connections Program, is designed to increase family involvement in community events and participating school events.

To be eligible to participate in the Family Engagement Program, your family must consist of at least one parent or guardian and one Native youth 24 years or younger who is eligible for services within the Seneca Nation Health System. Families must first register in the Family Engagement Program by signing up at the Native Connections table at participating events, or visit one of two Behavioral Health Unit locations at the Cattaraugus Health and Wellness Center or the Lionel R. John Health Center in Allegany.

SIMS Signals Success for Middle School

The Success in Middle School (SIMS) program has been meeting since October at J.T. Waugh and A.J. Schmidt Elementary schools. Title VI Liaison Nancy Klemens and J.O.M. Amanda Sobczyk coordinate the group that promotes a successful transition to Middle School. Some of the group's activities include: practicing combination locks, learning about the Middle School class schedule, homework load, and the cafeteria. Several exemplary students from the 6th grade meet with the SIMS group to talk with their 5th grade friends and offer their advice for a successful transition. The SIMS students have learned to sew and created small pillows for the elementary teacher that influenced their lives the most. Soon they will be sewing their own locker organizers which will follow them to Middle School. The character traits of respect, maturity and strength are emphasized throughout the program.

Currently the SIMS group is working on a new project. They are painting their clan on a banner made of Tribal cloth provided by the SNI Department of Education.
